Manhattan House Celebrates Artwork By Creative Growth & White Columns In Signature Residence By James Huniford

NEW YORK, NY—On November 10, Manhattan House, along with Interior Designer James Huniford, Elyse & Michael Newhouse and Ellen & Sam Newhouse, hosted nearly 100 art enthusiasts, brokers and other guests at a cocktail reception to celebrate the works of featured artists from

Creative Growth and White Columns in the newly unveiled signature residence by James Huniford.

Guests enjoyed cocktails and hors d'oeuvres from Betel, while viewing artwork from select artists, among them Creative Growth's Dan Miller, Judith Scot and Dwight Mackintosh. The lively artwork was displayed throughout Huniford's model residence and was available for purchase at the Upper East Side iconic, landmarked residential condominium.

Creative Growth Art Center serves adult artists with developmental, mental and physical disabilities and provides a stimulating environment for artistic instruction, gallery promotion and personal expression. Artwork fostered in this unique environment is included in prominent collections and museums worldwide.

White Columns is a not-for-profit gallery which is open to the public, free-of-charge and is New York's oldest alternative art space open eleven months per year. Over the past 40 years, hundreds of artists have benefited from early exposure and support at White Columns.

Located at 200 East 66th Street and set within private gardens, Manhattan House recently unveiled "The Modern Collection," brand-new residences available at the building that were created in response to a growing demand for larger homes in the city. This Mid-Century condominium is built to pre-war specifications and was designed in 1950 by Pritzker Architecture Prize Laureate Architect Gordon Bunshaft of Skidmore, Owings & Merrill.

Manhattan House has been impeccably re-engineered by O'Connor Capital Partners to combine its Modernist heritage with quintessential elements of contemporary living and unprecedented amenities and services. It was designated a historic landmark in 2007 by the New York City Landmarks Preservation Commission. The iconic building features spacious, light-infused one- to five-bedroom residences available for immediate occupancy.
